Ashley attended the four day National Conference for the Association of People Supporting Employment First (APSE) in

Columbus, Ohio this summer. APSE advocates for competitive integrated employment for people with disabilities. APSE feels everyone should be working for the same wages. Ashley said, "People want to work and can't for many reasons. More states want to be like Vermont with equal employment opportunities for everyone."

In 2021 Ashley was nominated for President of the Vermont Chapter by fellow peers and she accepted the 2 year commitment. She was re-elected in 2023 for another 2 year term. A different state hosts the National APSE meeting each year. Ashley and Michelle were the only ones attending from Vermont. There were over 500 APSE representatives attending from all over the United States.

Ashley enjoyed meeting new people in person who do similar work. She has lots of new ideas to share at work and on the job. The APSE presidents meet every other month by Zoom and the Vermont chapter meets every month by Zoom.

Sweet Chili Sauce

The Secret's in the Sauce—An Interview with Noah By Julie & Noah

How long have you been cooking? I've been cooking since the age of 4. My mother didn't like to cook so my siblings and I started cooking as soon as our elbows reached over the top the stove. Cooking was part of our chores growing up. I also worked in a Lao Thai kitchen when I was in college for about 2 years.

What do you like about cooking? For me cooking is more about enjoying the event that comes after. Whether it be a meal, dinner, or party you must cook to reach the goal of enjoying the food and/or event.

What sort of foods do you enjoy cooking? Lao, Vietnamese, all kinds of food. Its more about the taste then the specific culture. For example, I have a recipe for a French style meatloaf that a lot of people have asked about. I use a mirepoix (lots of veges) and sometimes mix pork in with the beef. I also bake the ketchup to bring out the taste. And then I have my Thai sweet chili brazed pork belly. You would be hard pressed to find two dishes or cultures so different from each other.

What are some of the sauces that you make? I make a Lao/Thai sweet chili sauce that I use as a brazing liquid for pork belly and an orange maple glaze for fish. The Lao/Thai chili sauce has some "heat" and takes about 3 hours to make. I make my own sauces because It's hard to find particular ones in the grocery store.

Do you sell the sauces you create? I don't sell them, but I have joked with people that if they want to hire me as a cook, I'd be ok with that.

Is there a certain kind of ethnic food that you enjoy cooking? Not really. It depends on what ingredients I have. It's not about the culture for me it's the taste. A lot of foods are the same from culture to culture. It's the seasoning/sauces that makes them taste different.
